

An iconic and vital species is at critical risk of extinction...

The River Ehen in Cumbria is a Site of Special Scientific Interest and a Special Area of Conservation due to the presence of the critically endangered freshwater pearl mussel (Margartifera margartifera).

Why are they so special?

 They can live for more than a century making them one of the longest-lived animals on the planet

• They clean our rivers, an individual can filter more water in a day than we use in an average shower

 They have an extraordinary life cycle. Mussel larvae spend their first few months growing on the gills of young Atlantic salmon or trout

A nationwide project, Pearls in Peril (PiP), is now underway to secure the future of the freshwater pearl mussel in Great Britain.

Freshwater mussels need:

- Exceptionally clean and stable river beds
- Very low levels of nutrients
- Plenty of fish to carry mussel larvae

How can we help them?

- Plant trees to reduce excess silt and nutrients entering the river
- Build fences to protect mussels from trampling
- Maintain drains and septic tanks to prevent pollution entering the river
- Involve local communities to learn more about this ancient and iconic species
